# ASSESSMENT TASKS, DUE DATES AND LEARNING HOURS

111.615 is a 15 credit course consisting of 150 learning hours. In assessment track A the assignment tasks and learning hours are as follows.

Full attendance at class periods is expected. Unsatisfactory attendance (less than 80%) is grounds for failure of the course.

Although this guideline regarding learning hours is not intended to be applied rigidly, it should help ensure a balanced workload.

There are two (2) assessment tasks for this course. These involve the following:

# i. Bible Book: Observation & Survey Task

Using the guide provided students will complete an assignment designed to develop skills in close observation of a bible book and present findings by way of identifying the structure (chart form) and a summary of the key themes and message of that book (essay form). You will need to choose which passage you will complete for assessment #2 and complete this assessment based on that book of the bible.

Guidelines will be provided on moodle.

Due date: End of week 5<sup>1</sup>
Length: 1250 words plus chart
Learning outcomes: 1, 3, 5.

# **Grading Criteria**

Close observation of the text

- Evidence of thorough observation identifying crucial textual elements of the text
- Analysis of structure and movement, and literary features
- Identification of genre and historical concerns of the original setting as identified from the text
- Identification of key theological and thematic concerns, and links to the wider biblical story
- Awareness of the significance of these factors for understanding the text

# ii. Exegetical Essay

The exegetical essay is the combination of all the relevant data amassed through exegetical analysis, into a coherent and readable discussion that draws out the author's intended meaning and logically unfolds the central integrating theme(s) of the passage. Your essay should evidence critical engagement with secondary sources and demonstrate your awareness of key hermeneutical concerns specific to your chosen text. See assessment guidelines for further information.

Due date: End of week 11
Length: 2500 words
Learning outcomes: 1, 2, 3, 4. 5, 6, 7

For your exegetical essay, choose one of the following texts:

- Galatians 5:2-12
- Ephesians 2:11-22
- Philippians 2:1-11
- 1 Peter 4:12-19
