ASSESSMENT TASKS AND DUE DATES

Assessment tasks involve the following:

1. Online Discussion

Learning outcomes: 3, 4

Due date: Midnight Sunday of lesson weeks 1, 2, 4, 7, 9, 11.

Weighting: 25%

Length: As indicated below

The online discussion requires you to engage with your classmates on various topics throughout the course. In six lessons you will be required to prepare an initial post on Moodle of 100-150 words, followed by a response to at least one other student's post of at least 50 words. You will be responsible to make this second and subsequent posts within one week of your initial post.

Specific instructions will accompany each online discussion task. <u>Managing your time is important</u>. Students are expected to complete all online discussions in a timely manner.

2. Narrative Essay

Learning outcomes: 3, 4

Due date: Midnight Sunday at the end of semester week 8

Weighting: 25% Length: 650 Words Write a 650 word essay on <u>one</u> of the following key narrative sections of the Old Testament:

- The life of Abraham as a prime example of divine blessing.
- The Exodus story from the burning bush until the building of the tabernacle.
- The Story of David from his anointing to becoming king of all Israel (1 Sam 16—2 Sam 20), reflecting on his career and character.

In your essay, you should

- (a) summarise the key facts that make up your chosen part of the biblical story
- (b) explain how this part of the Bible helps in our understanding of God, and
- (c) explain how this part of the Bible helps in our understanding of the rest of the Bible

You should write approximately equal amounts for the above three sections of your essay.

3. Thematic essay

Learning outcomes: 2, 5

Due date: Midnight Sunday at the end of semester week 12

Weighting: 25% Length: 800 Words

Write an 800 word essay on one of the following themes:

- Creation
- Land
- Temple.

Write your essay in two main parts:

Part 1. Discuss two aspects of your chosen theme in the Old Testament.

Part 2. Show how each of these aspects are fulfilled or developed in the New Testament.

Your essay should also include an introduction and a conclusion. You should write approximately the same amount on each of parts 1 and 2. Your essay should refer to 4 or 5 sources that you have read in preparation for your writing. Be sure to reference your sources using footnotes, and also include them in your bibliography.

4. Self-Tests

Narrative Essay

- Coverage: includes all the important events of the chosen narrative section
- Explanation: evidence of careful thinking about how the narrative helps our wider understanding of God and the Bible
- Structure: the essay has an introduction, body, and conclusion; is in good paragraphs; flows well, in a logical order.
- Communication/ presentation: message is clear, spelling and grammar correct, written in own words.

Thematic Essay

- Coverage: includes two aspects of chosen theme.
- Careful thought: shows understanding of the theme and its changes from the Old Testament to the New Testament.
- Structure: the essay has an introduction, body, conclusion; is in good paragraphs; flows well, in a logical order.
- Communication/ presentation: message is clear, spelling and grammar correct, written in own words; Biblical references are included in brackets and sources are acknowledged (footnotes); bibliography (4 5 works) in proper format.

Self-Tests (five)

• Self-directed and sequential learning of material in five modules (3, 4, 6, 8 and 9).
