ASSESSMENT TASKS AND DUE DATES

1. Critical Assessment of a Piece of Theological Writing

Length: 1200
Learning outcomes: 1, 2
Percentage weighting: 15%

Due date: 11.55pm, 30 August

The critique will examine a short piece of theological writing and answer the question: 'Is this good theology? The article will be provided by the lecturer along with an explanatory sheet of instructions for the assignment. Students will then have two weeks in which to complete their analysis.

Criteria for Assessment

1	Comprehension: Balanced understanding of the text under critique.
2	Analysis and judgment: Employment of balanced theological method; discernment of the influence of culture, language and experience
3	Structure: Clear and logical arrangement of ideas; valid conclusions
4	Communication and presentation: Clarity, format, spelling, grammar; annotation and bibliography

2. Research Task with Integrative Reflection

Length: 2500 words

Learning outcomes: 3, 4

Percentage weighting: 35% (2 x 17.5%)

Due date: Theological terms 1 to 5 due, 11:55pm 20 September

Theological terms 6 to 10 due, 11:55pm 1 November

This will be a two-part research task in which students are asked to write a total of TEN carefully crafted and theologically balanced definitions of ten key theological terms relating to the course material, with some integrative application to life and ministry; each definition being 250 words. Five theological terms will be provided by the course lecturer at least two week prior to each of the two due dates.

Criteria for Assessment

1	Research: Appropriate research
2	Theological analysis: Theological understanding; balanced coverage of main points
3	Integrative application: Relevant application; depth of contextual insight
4	Communication and presentation: Clarity, format, spelling, grammar; annotation and bibliography
5	Research: Appropriate research

3. Exam

The exam paper will assess students' grasp of the content of basic Christian beliefs and their ability to apply sound theological method in the expression of that content. The exam will be $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours long.
