CONTENT OVERVIEW

The course will define good theology and then discuss the biblical foundations and later development of the following topics:

- 1. Christian belief: Unity and diversity
- Sources and norms of Christian belief: One and many
- 3. Divine revelation and good theology: Universal and particular
- God: Great and good
 God: Three and one
- 6. Creation: Good and fallen
- 7. Humanity: Creature, sinner, and new being in Christ
- 8. Jesus Christ: Human and divine9. Salvation: Objective and subjective
- 10. Salvation: Gift and task
- 11. The church: Visible and invisible, worshipping and missional
- 12. Eschatology: Continuity and discontinuity in the Kingdom

ASSESSMENT TASKS AND DUE DATES

There are three assessment tasks:

1. Online discussion

Online discussion topics require you to engage with various themes and topics. Typically these tasks will require you to prepare an initial post of 250 words, followed by at least one response to at least one class member of at least 50 words. Specific instructions will accompany each online discussion task. Students are required to participate in six online discussions.

2. Theological Assessment

Percentage Weighting 30% Length 1200 words

Expected Sources: Minimum three (including article examined)

The goal of this assessment is that you will be able to recognise constructive theology, and so better articulate the content of the Christian faith.

Summarise the overall **theological teaching** in <u>one</u> of the articles given below (and available on Moodle). Do this by identifying the aspects of belief it addresses, and the sources the article draws on to make its points.

Olson, Duane. "Contextualization – Everyone's Doing It." Word & World 10, 4 (1990):349-355.

3. Exam

Learning outcomes: 1-3
Percentage Weighting 40%

Length 2 hours duration

Type of questions: 4 essay-type questions

The exam paper will assess students' grasp of the content of basic Christian beliefs and their ability to apply sound theological method in the expression of that content.

The exam will be open book; questions will not be known by students in advance. Students must respond to questions completely in their own words (so no referencing is required). For this reason the exam must be done online (on Moodle) to allow automated plagiarism checking.

2. Theological Assessment

- Comprehension: Balanced understanding of the text under critique; identification of the aspects of belief addressed
- Analysis and judgment: Employment of balanced theological method; discernment of theological sources
- Structure: Clear and logical arrangement of ideas; valid conclusions
- Communication and presentation: Clarity, format, spelling, grammar; annotation and bibliography

3. Exam

- Coverage of main points
- Shows understanding of the content, unity and diversity of basic Christian beliefs
- Clarity & development of answer
