1. Revelation: Essay

Length: 2000 words in total

Learning outcomes: 3, 4 Weighting: 30%

Due date: Sunday, 16th August by 11.59pm.

Criteria for Assessment

- Does the essay address the topic clearly and comprehensively?
- Quality of discussion and depth of critical understanding apparent in the essay.
- Evidence and quality of research for essay. Access and use of appropriate books, journal articles, and other sources.
- Quality of written expression. Accuracy in referencing and bibliography according to Laidlaw College approved style.

2. Christology: Theological Reflection on Art

Length: 1500 words in total

Learning outcomes: 1, 2 Weighting: 20%

Due date: Sunday, 27th September by 11.59pm.

Reflect *theologically* on a work of visual art depicting Jesus Christ. Discuss the work, its reception and what Christologically informed reflection it elicits.

Criteria for Assessment

- Suitability of the work selected for reflection
- Reflection demonstrates appreciation of possible Christological doctrines and issues inherent in the chosen work.
- Quality of discussion and depth of understanding apparent in the reflection.
- Evidence and quality of research for essay. Access and use of appropriate books, journal articles, and other sources.
- Quality of written expression. Accuracy in referencing and bibliography according to Laidlaw College approved style.

3. Christology: Research Essay

Length: 3000 words in total

Learning outcomes: 1, 2, 4 Weighting: 50%
