CONTENT OVERVIEW

Beginning with a broad examination of the varying means by which God reveals himself to humanity, this course then focuses quickly on God's fullest and most complete revelation in Jesus Christ. It explores Christ's person and work in depth, through the lens of the Scriptures, the early Creeds, and the protestant reformation. Utilising the insights gained through these explorations, the focus turns in the final part of the course to the enduring and universal relevance of Jesus in a postmodern cultural understanding. Issues such as diversity, worship and suffering are explored through a Christological framework, using the research of prominent contemporary theologians as an illustration and guide.

ASSESSMENT TASKS AND DUE DATES

1. Analytical film review

Read both the following readings available in Moodle.

- Tatum, W. Barnes. "The Passion of Christ in the History of Jesus Films". In *Jesus and Mel Gibson's The Passion of Christ*, edited by Kathleen Corley & Robert Webb, 141-150. New York: Continuum, 2004.
- Cunningham, Philip. "Much will be required of the person entrusted with much: Assembling a passion drama from the four gospels." In *On the Passion of the Christ: Exploring the Issues Raised by the Controversial Movie*, edited by Paula Fredriksen, 49-64. Berkeley: University of California Press, 2006.

Make particular note of the following statement from Tatum:

"When I view each Jesus film I ask myself to what extent is it not only artistically interesting, but literally sensitive to the Gospel sources, historically probable, and theologically satisfying." (p.149)

Choose one recent filmic retelling of the Jesus story, and answer the following question about it:

Recognising the necessity of and acceptability for artistic license in a movie about Jesus' life, to what extent is this retelling of the story theologically consistent with the special revelation given in the Scriptures.

Because the readings above deal with Mel Gibson's "The Passion of the Christ" that film is **excluded** from this assignment. A list of suitable films is available in Moodle. Some of these will be available in the College Library, while others should be available from your public library or local video rental shop.

Grading Criteria:

- Suitability of film/TV episode selected for review
- Review directly answers the question asked (focusing on theology, not other aspects)
- Quality of discussion and depth of understanding apparent in the review
- Evidence and quality of research for essay. Access and use of appropriate books, journal articles, and other sources (use at least 6 other sources)
- Quality of written expression. Accuracy in referencing and bibliography according to Laidlaw College approved style.

2. Research Essay

Write a 2500 word essay on one of the following topics:

1. How does the Jesus of history relate to the Christ of faith? How do they differ and what are the implications of this for mission and ministry today?

- 2. What is the vicarious humanity of Christ and how does it impact our life, ministry and mission as followers of Jesus?
- 3. "Penal substitution is the only truly biblical atonement theory and incorporates all the others." Comment on and critique this claim.
- 4. Is a Spirit Christology that is compatible with the Scriptures and the creeds viable? What are its constituent characteristics? What benefits and challenges arise from such an understanding?
- 5. "The theology of the cross must be the doctrine of the Trinity, and the doctrine of the Trinity must be the theology of the cross." (Moltmann) Discuss this statement in the light of the way Moltmann develops his Christology, and its relevance to ministry and mission today.

Other essay topics (relating to Christology) will certainly be considered. If you would like to explore another dimension of Christology please contact the lecturer as early as possible to discuss.

Independent of topic, your essay should take into account developments of Christology, including early church positions and contemporary reframing of doctrine, as well contemporary Christological challenges and perspectives. You should interact with at least 10 academic resources (books, journal articles, (not websites!))

3. Fixed Time Assessment

This is an online, open book exam paper that you can do anytime over a period of 3 days. It will cover all of the aspects of the course.

Online: The exam will be made available online early on the 11th November, and will need to be submitted by the end of the day (11:59pm) on the 13th November.

Open Book: The essay will be an open book exam, which means you are free (and encouraged) to use the full time to research your answers by consulting with your course notes, your own work, and other books and articles.

The exam will consist of 4 short essays, each about 2 typed pages (or 500 words) long. No marks will be given and no penalties received for layout, style or referencing.

The four questions asked will relate to the following areas:

- 1) Revelation and / or Scripture
- 2) Biblical Christology
- 3) Patristic and / or Reformation Understandings of Christ
- 4) Contemporary Application and Outworking of Christology

Assessment Criteria

- Logical and coherent answers that directly answer the question given in a
- Consistent and comprehensive (within the available word limit) answers
- Specific points of theological substance are made
- Comprehension of central themes of the course
- Awareness of the interconnectedness of theological doctrines
- · Rigorous application of theological method
- Direct reference to biblical texts is required where appropriate
