Biographical Essay

Percentage Weighting: 45% Word Count: 2500

You are to write an essay which explores a particular missionary's work in their mission context. Some research will be required to find a missionary who has worked with adherents of a non-Christian religion. If you personally know a missionary who has worked in the context of a non-Christian religion and who has made a serious study of it, you may interview them as part of your study.

In your essay you should:

- Describe the chosen religion at a popular ('folk') level as well as at an official level. (It is not necessary to outline widely known teachings of the religion).
- State what you understand by 'theology of religion' and discuss the theology of religion
 of the missionary you have chosen, outlining his/her attitudes towards the religion as a
 system of beliefs and as a community.
- Critically evaluate the effectiveness of the missionary's work and discuss what may be learned for Christian witness.

Biographical Essay

• Clearly identifies a missionary/s, discusses the religious context and period of ministry in

- that setting, and shows the significance of the history of the encounter of Christian faith with the chosen religion.
- Discusses the central beliefs and significant practices of the chosen religion in the particular setting in which the missionary/s worked.
- Describes and evaluates the missionary's work and the nature of their relationship with the people.
- Explains the term "theology of religion" and discusses the missionary's theology of religion in their context.
- Identifies the perspective of the missionary regarding continuity & discontinuity between Christian faith and the chosen religion.
- Critically evaluates the missionary's effectiveness in relating to the chosen people group and discusses how this may inform encounter with other religions.
- Communication and presentation: Clarity, format, spelling and grammar; annotation and bibliography.
