2. Essay on a Majority World theologian

Choose a Majority World theologian. Provide brief biographical details and description of the context (historical, social, cultural, economic and political) within which the theologian lived and worked. Examine the ways in which the theologian's work relates to the specific context and identify and discuss at least four major themes addressed in that work. Comment on the theologian's contribution to theology in general and discuss how the theologian's thinking has challenged your understanding of the gospel.

3. Theological reflection on Majority World theologies

Choose three Majority World theologies studied in class. Provide a description of the context of each of the theologies. Identify and discuss at least four major theological themes of each theology. Think deeply about the theologies and address the questions, 'What do these theologies have in common?' 'How do they differ?' 'How have these theologies challenged my understanding of my own context and theology?'

GRADING CRITERIA

- 1. Reflective Review of readings
 - Summary of each author's purpose
 - Identification of key elements of contextual theology
 - Comment on the significance of those elements
 - Personal reflection on the readings (insights gained, challenges to student's thinking, issues arising
 - Presentation (spelling, grammar, layout, correct referencing, etc)
- 2. Essay on Majority World theologian
 - Adequacy of biographical information concerning the chosen theologian
 - Description of context of the theologian's work (historical, social, cultural, economical, and political)
 - Examination of the relationship between the theologian's work and the context
 - Identification of three major themes addressed by the theologian
 - Comment on theologian's contribution to theology
 - Discussion of the challenges to the student's personal understanding of the gospel
 - Presentation (spelling, grammar, layout, correct referencing, etc)
- 3. Theological reflection on Majority world theologies
 - Adequacy of explanation of the contexts of the three chosen Majority world theologies

- Demonstration of thorough understanding of major theological themes of chosen theologies
- Thoroughness of discussion of the chosen Majority world theologies
- Comment on ways in which student's understanding of own context has been challenged by the study of Majority World theologies
