2. Essay on a Majority World theologian

Choose a Majority World theologian for this essay. Provide a description of the context (historical, social, cultural, economic and political) within which the theologian lived and worked. Examine and critically assess the ways in which the theologian's work relates to the specific context. Identify and critically discuss at least four major themes addressed in that work. Provide a critical commentary on the theologian's contribution to theology in general and discuss how the theologian's thinking has challenged your understanding of the gospel.

3. Essay on Majority World theologies

Choose three Majority World theologies studied in class. In an essay, describe briefly how each theology has developed, taking into account the historical development, any significant political, cultural, economic and external influences. Identify and discuss a range of key issues and significant themes addressed by theologians in the contexts you have chosen. Evaluate each theology, identifying perceived weaknesses and strengths and how each theology has potentially shaped the life and mission outreach of the church in its own context. Discuss the contribution of Majority World theologies to the wider church.

GRADING CRITERIA

- 1. Critical Review of readings
 - Summary of each author's purpose
 - Identification of key elements and concerns of contextual theology raised by the writers
 - Discussion of the significance for the writers of those elements and concerns
 - Critical nature of the reflection on the readings (material evaluated, indication of insights gained, explanation of the challenges to the student's thinking and of questions that the readings raised)
 - Presentation (spelling, grammar, layout, correct referencing, etc)
- 2. Essay on Majority World theologian
 - Thorough research on biographical information concerning the chosen theologian
 - Depth of understanding of the context of the theologian's work (historical, social, cultural, economic, and political)
 - Critical examination of the relationship between the theologian's work and the context
 - Identification of three major themes addressed by the theologian
 - Critical commentary on theologian's contribution to theology
 - Discussion of the challenges to the student's personal understanding of the gospel
 - Presentation (spelling, grammar, layout, correct referencing, etc)

- 3. Essay on Majority World theologies
 - Clear identification of three Majority World theologies and a depth of understanding of their development (historical, social, cultural, economical and political factors)
 - Discussion of a range of key issues and significant themes addressed by theologians in each of the contexts
 - Critical evaluation of each of the theologies (perceived weaknesses and strengths) for the life and mission of the church in its own context
 - Critical appraisal of the shaping influence of Majority World theologies on the church's life and mission in general
 - Presentation (spelling, grammar, layout, correct referencing, etc)
