UNIT DESCRIPTION

This unit acknowledges the bicultural foundations of Aotearoa New Zealand. It promotes the exploration and understanding of the unique bicultural relationship that derives from Te Tiriti o Waitangi. Students will explore current and historic philosophical perspectives, including Biblical World View, for the teaching of Social Studies, developing in students an understanding of how different philosophical approaches impact the Social Science curriculum. Students will explore and interact with *The New Zealand Curriculum (2007)* document as they relate to teaching Social Sciences in the pre-secondary classroom. Inquiry Learning will be used when planning Social Studies units. Students will research and plan a term unit with appropriate learning activities and assessment tasks and will collect and produce suitable resources. Students will undertake personal learning of people, places, cultures, histories and the economic world, within and beyond Aotearoa New Zealand.
