ASSESSMENTS

1. Compose an essay on a prominent theme in the Psalter – 2500 words (40%)

This essay will require that you carefully explain an important theological theme found in the Psalter. You will need to place the theme in its larger canonical context, and explain the significance of the theme in its ancient cultural context. You will also give careful thought to the contemporary relevance of the theme. A more detailed outline of the requirements for this assignment will be distributed with the course material.

This essay will assess learning outcomes iii, iv and vi, and is due at 11.55pm on Saturday of week 3.

When grading the thematic essay I will apply the following criteria.

- Do you use sound exegetical method in investigating the theme and its meaning?
- Do you deal with the theme comprehensively? Do you identify the theme wherever it occurs in the Psalter, and note the varied language with which the theme is expressed? Do you show an awareness of how the theme develops in the canon?
- Do you locate the theme within the web of theological themes found in Scripture? This will require that you introduce related theological ideas (that support or complement your theme, or exist in tension with it), and which provide a context in which to understand it better.
- Do you use a range of good quality resources for exploring the theology of the Psalter?
- How well do you make the move from the world of the biblical text to the world of today? This movement must be credible, and substantial. In other words you will need to look carefully at the ways in which the theme functions in the biblical text, and in the social world of the psalmist, before commenting on its contemporary relevance.
- Does the presentation of your paper reflect careful editing (writing and rewriting)? The English should be clear, grammatical and relatively free of errors, and the paper should be well organised.
- 2. A study of Psalm 73 2500 words (40%)

This is essentially an exegetical study of Psalm 73, but it will also require that you engage in theological reflection. You will also be expected to show the contemporary relevance of the Psalm's message. A more detailed outline of the requirements for this assignment will be distributed with the course material.

This assignment will assess learning outcomes ii, iii, v and vi. It is due at 11.55pm on Saturday of week 7.

When grading the exegetical paper on Psalm 73 I will apply the following criteria.

Do you correctly identify the genre of the psalm?

Do you use sound exegetical method, and do you exercise good judgment when making interpretive decisions?

Have you identified the key interpretive issues in the Psalm?

How well do you analyse the structure of a psalm and follow the flow of thought from one line to the next?

- Are you sensitive in your reading of Hebrew poetry? Do you identify and explain the features of Hebrew poetry in the Psalm?
- Do you use a range of good quality resources for interpreting the text of the Psalm? Do you use these resources well?
- Have you engaged in substantive theological reflection? This will include reflection on themes found in the psalm, on their development elsewhere in the Psalter and in the cannon of Scripture. It will also include reflection on how these themes must be brought into contact with themes found elsewhere in Scripture in order to provide a more comprehensive understanding of how the Scriptures address the psalmist's concern.
- How well do you make the move from the world of the biblical text to the world of today? This movement must be credible (rooted in the text), and substantial (meaningful for life today).
- Does the presentation of your paper reflect careful editing (writing and rewriting)? The English should be clear, grammatical and relatively free of errors, and the paper should be well organised.
- 3. Critical Book Review 1000 words (20%)

You will write a critical book review of John N. Day, *Crying for Justice. What the Psalms teach us about mercy and vengeance in an age of terrorism*, Grand Rapids: Kregel, 2005.

The book review will assess learning outcomes i, iii, and vi. It is due at 11.55pm on Saturday of week 11.

When grading the book review I will apply the following criteria.

Have you read the book with understanding? Is your analysis is informed by wider reading and awareness? Do you interact critically with the argument of the book? Clarity of Expression
