Using historical evidence, argue for or against this stereotypical view of the Puritans.

OR:

Should truth or unity be the priority for the church? Answer this question with reference to the issue of slavery in 19th Century America. Did the northern denominations make the right decision to split with the south? Could they have done more to maintain unity? Explain your answers.

OR:

The last two centuries have seen enormous growth of the church in Latin America sub-Saharan Africa, and parts of Asia. Choose one of the following countries:

South Korea

- China
- Nigeria
- Tanzania
- Brazil

Where appropriate you can choose to focus on either the Catholic or Protestant church. Describe and evaluate the history of the church based on the following criteria:

- Growth
- Relevance to local culture
- Faithfulness to the Gospel
